One of the exciting highlights of the evening was the sharing of memories by BTW alumni and former staff.

Booker T. Washington was originally a school for African-American students, and former students and staff told stories about the way things were when the schools were still segregated.

Wallace Hicks spoke of meeting his wife of nearly 70 years on the stage in the first Booker T. Washington School.

Cecil Wilson, former BTW principal, talked about his experiences during his tenure at the school as did Dr. Dan Kingery, also a former principal, who stated that his 15 years at Booker T. Washington were the best years in his career as an educator.

Reba Hollingsworth along with other former students sang the BTW song they recalled from their youth.

Current BTW fourth-grade students gave tours of the building. The evening ended with refreshments by Dover High School's Culinary Students.

"It was an honor to work on the dedication. I loved hearing all of the shared stories," said Candace McCarthy, an organizer of the event.
